Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

Picture yourself standing on the shore of a vast ocean, the salty breeze tousling your hair as you gaze out into the expanse of blue. The horizon stretches endlessly, a boundary between the known and the unknown. As you peer into the depths, a sense of awe and trepidation washes over you, for beyond that line lies a world of uncertainty, of unseen dangers and untold adventures.

In the distance, a storm brews on the horizon, dark clouds gathering ominously overhead. The waves begin to churn, their rhythm disrupted by the approaching tempest. Your heart quickens with each crash of thunder, each bolt of lightning illuminating the darkened sky. The future seems uncertain, obscured by the looming shadows of doubt and fear.

As the first drops of rain begin to fall, you find yourself aboard a small boat, adrift amidst the roiling waves. The vessel rocks violently, threatening to capsize at any moment. Fear grips your heart as you cling desperately to the railing, your eyes searching the horizon for a glimmer of hope amidst the chaos. But there is only darkness, stretching out before you like an endless abyss.

In the midst of the storm, with no land and no end to the tempest in sight, you are left to grapple with the uncertainty of your fate. Each crashing wave serves as a reminder of your vulnerability, of the fragility of human existence in the face of nature's fury. And yet, amidst the chaos and the fear, there remains a glimmer of hope—a belief that somehow, someway, you will find your way through the storm and emerge on the other side, battered but unbroken, ready to face whatever challenges lie ahead.

In the midst of life's uncertainties, it's natural to seek reassurance, to yearn for a glimpse into the future, to desire certainty in an uncertain world. Yet, as Søren Kierkegaard eloquently articulates, faith is not about grasping God objectively but rather about embracing the objective uncertainty that defines our human existence. He poignantly illustrates this concept through the metaphor of floating in 70,000 fathoms of water, a vivid image of the depths of faith and trust required to navigate life's challenges.

Kierkegaard challenges us to confront the paradox of faith: that it flourishes in the absence of absolute certainty. In recognizing our limitations, our inability to fully comprehend the divine, we are compelled to place our trust in God. It is precisely because we cannot grasp God objectively that we must believe. This is not a blind leap into the unknown, but a courageous venture into the depths of faith, where we find the assurance that God is with us, even when the waters of uncertainty threaten to overwhelm us.

In this present moment, we find ourselves navigating uncharted waters. Our community has been facing challenges—our attendance is down, our giving is down, we are going down to part-time status, and we are in the midst of a pastoral transition. The uncertainty of these times can be daunting, and it's easy to become lost in a sea of "what ifs." Yet, amidst the uncertainty, one thing remains constant: Christ stands before us, leading the way.

As we confront the uncertainties of the future, let us hold fast to our faith in Christ. Let us remember that even in the midst of storms, he is our anchor, our rock, and our refuge. Let us trust that Jesus will guide us through this season of transition, just as he has guided his people through countless trials throughout history.

Our journey of faith is not without its challenges, but it is in these moments of uncertainty that our faith is truly tested and strengthened. Let us embrace the unknown with courage and conviction, knowing that God is always faithful to His promises. As we navigate the waters ahead, may we find comfort in the words of Psalm 23:4, "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me."

Let us lean into our faith, trusting that even when we cannot see the way forward, God is already there, leading us with love and grace. May we find solace in the knowledge that we are not alone on this journey, but are held securely in the palm of God's hand.

Grace and Peace be with you in the name of our Risen Savior!

I was surprised and delighted(?) to be approached a few weeks ago by Reverend Dr. Eunice Vega-Perez, our District Superintendent, that the bishop would like me to serve in a half-time appointment.

"But, I'm retired!" Î said, "And I really don't want to work by myself half-time—because, I know that would mean that I was really going to be working full time, and besides, that, we travel a lot in retirement and

already have some plans for the coming year that we cannot change." I paused a moment…long enough for her to say.

"Let me at least tell you where it is." "OK." I assented,

"It's Newton." she said. I was quiet for a moment before I replied, "Oh! That's different, then. Did you know that as a young pastor, I had always wanted to serve the church in Newton? I still can't do half-time, but if you could you put together a team approach, I would be glad to coordinate it; that way I could still do some traveling and still help do the work at Newton." She liked the idea too! And so, she presented that possibility to Bishop Schol and he suggested that Monica Mafarachisi, a bright third-year student at Drew Seminary who had been accepted into the annual conference's Mosaic program for helping develop talented young pastors, would be a great one to work with me and this congregation. Additionally, as needed, our work will be supplemented by a Lay Servant or Lay Servants. We met together with the Staff-Parish Committee and we were all excited about how God might use us to help the church heal from some past hurts, do a good assessment of where we are, and do some dreaming about where God is calling us to go into the future.

So, let me take an opportunity to introduce myself as the Elder half of your new pastoral team as of July 2024. During my 40 years of active ministry, I faithfully served local churches in rural, urban, and suburban settings and was also the Raritan/Raritan Valley District Superintendent (1996-2004). The last 13 years prior to my retirement in 2018, I served Bridgewater UMC. I did my Master of Divinity at Drew Seminary and my Doctor of Ministry at Wesley Seminary (with my good friend Rev. Nancy Belsky). I also have taught UM doctrine and polity at Palmer Seminary in Philadelphia and church administration at Drew Seminary as an adjunct professor, as well as the Advanced Lay Speaker's classes a number of times.
